GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING HEALTHCARE ANNOUNCEMENT

Don't forget to put on your calendar the next upcoming COPRA General Membership Meeting! It will be held on **Thursday**, **September 15**, **2016 at 1:30 p.m.** at the Washington Activity Center located at 2240 W. Citrus Way in Phoenix. **Please note this date is a change from what was previously published**. Healthcare benefits & plans will be reviewed for the upcoming open enrollment period.

HEALTHCARE - OPEN ENROLLMENT

Open Enrollment takes place from October 24th to November 14th for the 2017 plan year which begins January 1st. The City continues to offer medical coverage to non-Medicare retirees and eligible dependents in 2017. Dental coverage, legal insurance and elder care services continue to be available to all retirees, Medicare and non-Medicare.

A retiree benefits guide for 2017 will be mailed to all retirees in mid-September. Information meetings for non-Medicare retirees and eligible dependents will take place in September beginning with the COPRA meeting on September 15th at the Washington Activity Center from 1:30 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. located at 2240 W. Citrus Way. Additional information meetings are scheduled at the Washington Activity Center on September 20th, September 22nd, September 27th and September 29th from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. The main topic at this meeting will be the 2017 non-Medicare retiree medical plans and premiums. There will also be information for Medicare eligible retirees on Towers Watson One Exchange, Cigna Dental and ARAG Legal Insurance. The presentation from these meetings will be posted on the COPRA website at

<u>www.phoenixcopra.com</u> and on the City's benefits division web page at <u>employee.phoenix.gov/benefits</u>. The City's Benefits Office staff will be available for questions at 602-262-4777 or <u>benefits.guestions@phoenix.gov</u>.

Non-Medicare medical plan rates for 2017 would have increased almost 48% without assistance from the City and changes to plan design. By using a portion of the Retiree Rate Stabilization Fund and changing plan design features, the 2017 overall medical rate increase is 10% instead

tend a meeting. If you are not local or are unable to attend, the presentation from these meetings will be posted on our COPRA website www.phoenixcopra.com. Human Resources will also post it on their Benefits Division web page at employee.phoenix.gov/benefits. Further, the City's Benefits Office staff is always available for questions at (602) 262-4777. They also have FAQs posted at benefits.guestions@phoenix.gov. The Retiree Benefits Guide for 2017 will be mailed to all retirees in mid-September. Hopefully, all of these sources will give us the information we need to make informed decisions on our health care for the upcoming year.

Open Enrollment takes place from October 24th to November 14th for the plan year beginning January 1, 2017. The City will continue to offer medical coverage to non-Medicare retirees and eligible dependents for this upcoming plan year. See the article in this issue for the details and updates on this coverage. Dental coverage, legal insurance and elder care services will continue to be available for non-Medicare and Medicare Retirees. Towers Watson OneExchange is available to assist both Medicare and non-Medicare enrollees on their private exchange or the public exchange. MERP will continue to be handled as it is currently.

I encourage everyone who can, to attend one of the information meetings, as well as read the Retiree Information Guide for 2017. There will be staff from the City Benefits area to present current information as well as answer all your questions. Don't miss this opportunity to get all the information available to help you make the right decisions that will provide you with the best answer for your health care needs. COPRA in partnership with the City is working to provide you with the tools you need for these important decisions.

of 48%. The Savers Choice Plan (high deductible health plan) stays the same, the HMO plan includes an annual deductible (\$350 for single coverage, \$700 for family) and higher pharmacy co-pays. The provider network continues to be Cigna's Open Access Network. The PPO also includes an annual deductible (\$1,000 for in-network single coverage, \$2,000 for family) plus 20% coinsurance and higher pharmacy co-pays. The PPO continues to offer BlueCross/BlueShield's large, national network and out-of-network coverage at a higher level of deductible and coinsurance. Details will be provided in the 2017 retiree benefits guide you'll receive by mail in mid-September and at the information meetings.

You are probably wondering what the future holds for the City's retiree medical plan. Everyone can probably agree it's not sustainable for the City to continue providing coverage to a smaller number of retirees each year. City representatives recently met with Arizona State Retirement System (ASRS) executives to discuss changing the State statute to allow City of Phoenix civilian retirees access to the ASRS retiree benefit plans. The ASRS offers affordable and comprehensive coverage to hundreds of thousands of retirees from the State of Arizona and its counties, municipalities, and school districts. The City of Phoenix public safety retirees already have access to ASRS benefits. The City's Government Relations Division and the Human Resources Department Benefits Division will continue their efforts toward this goal.

Cigna dental coverage continues to be available in 2017. If you enrolled in the dental coverage earlier this year and want to continue your coverage into 2017, do nothing and it goes on at the same premium rates you have today. If you didn't enroll this year and want to enroll for 2017, you'll find the dental enrollment form and instructions in the retiree benefit guide. 2016 dental rates continue into 2017. Please be aware that a Cigna subsidiary, Allegiance COBRA Administration, is handling the enrollment and premium payment aspects of this dental coverage. Premiums are not taken from your pension check for dental coverage. You pay Allegiance directly each month either by check or money order, or by allowing them to electronically take payment from your checking or savings account each month.

ARAG legal insurance continues to be available but with expanded coverage and a slightly higher monthly premium. You'll see more information about this in the mail from ARAG and in the 2017 retiree benefits guide.

OneExchange can assist with Medicare or non-Medicare individual enrollment options on the public and private exchange. And all retirees have access to Elder Care Services through the City's Employee Assistance Program vendor, MHN. Information on these topics is included in the guide.

DIRTY AIR FILTERS ARE AC ENEMIES

The air filter is an important part of your AC system. By removing dust and debris from the air, you get to enjoy better indoor air quality and the air condition operates more efficiently. But, when these filters become dirty, they trigger a whole host of problems. Clogged filters restrict air flow to the unit, which causes the AC system to run longer and cool less efficiently and may lead to early system failure. What's more, systems with dirty air filters use up to 15% more energy, according to the U.S. Department of Energy.

SRP recommends changing your filter every month, especially during the summer months when your system gets used the most.

What's Recyclable In Phoenix?

It's been 25 years since the City of Phoenix introduced single-stream recycling to residents, making it convenient for residents to divert recyclable materials from the landfill. Today, we offer recycling collection services to more than 390.000 households.

The Public Works in partnership with Keep America Beautiful launched the "Top 10 in the Bin" to re-educate and refresh residents' minds on recycling right. What's recyclable in Phoenix, reminds residents about the top

10 materials that should always be placed in the blue recycling bin: plastic bottles with caps on, beverage cans, mail, food boxes, paper, plastic jugs, food jars, beverage glass bottles, food cans and cardboard.

Aside from the top 10 materials recyclable materials, the top three items that should *never* be placed in the blue



recycling bin: plastic bags and wraps, electronics, and clothing or textiles. These materials can be recycled, but not in Phoenix's recycling program. Residents are asked to bring clean plastic bags and wraps to the nearest grocery store; electronics can be dropped off at one of the nine household hazardous waste and electronics collection event hosted by the city at different locations; and clothing and other textiles should be donated to resale shops. Recycling is important and one of the easiest ways to divert waste. Ensuring the recyclable materials are not contaminated by non-recyclable materials is equally important.

Phoenix has a goal of increasing its waste diversion rate to 40 percent by 2020. Reimagine Phoenix, the city's sustainability initiative launched in 2013, has already jumpstarted new solid waste programs and projects that could assist in reaching that goal, including the implementation of a pay-as-you-throw program, as well as a green organics curbside collection. This is good for the environment and good for current rate payers as well as future rate payers. Every ton diverted from the landfill saves \$17 per ton.


