President's Message

Fall will soon be upon us in the Northern Hemisphere. The time when daylight hours shorten, temperatures start to cool and most red-blooded Americans want 24/7 football. As with most things in this COVID-influenced life we lead, we are a bit upside down and are confused if it is 2020 or 2021 after watching the Tokyo Olympics.

I grew up obsessed with sporting events, especially the Olympics. Like ABC's Wide World of Sports always said: "The Thrill of Victory and the Agony of Defeat." My most memorable examples of this: the US beating the Soviet Union in the, 'Miracle on Ice' hockey game in 1980 to set them up for the eventual gold medal against Finland; the heartbreak in 1972 losing to the Soviets in basketball in a heavily contested and protested gold medal game. So

many names of champions and athletes we cheered: Carl Lewis; Nadia Comaneci; Eric Heiden; Michael Phelps; Usain Bolt; Bruce Jenner; Brandi Chastain; Mark Spitz; Mary Lou Retton.

Growing up, my focus was not who won a medal, but who represented themselves and country the best. When television commentators opined how unfortunate the athlete placed fourth and missed a medal, I would focus on the fact the athlete just blew their personal best, AKA "PB" out of the water! They have NEVER performed better. How great to peak during the Olympics and leave with a smile and PB!

That same thought came over me during my time watching the 2020 Tokyo Summer Olympics in the summer of 2021. These athletes have incurred so much in their life just for the chance to be an Olympic athlete. Of the scores and perhaps hundreds of athletes who compete in each event, only three can walk away with a physical prize. The rest bring home the fact they competed in one of the strangest sporting events of all times.

The Olympics were delayed not due to military conflict or political disagreement, as has happened in the past, but due to a pathogen wreaking havoc around the globe. The athletes were able to train in strange conditions, subject themselves to multiple tests and protocols, just for the opportunity to, at least, score a PB!

We all have experienced sacrifices over the past (too tired to count) umpteen months! We have each endured our own Olympic journey. Too many lives lost. Too many opportunities lost. Yet, we remained focused on what is that PB we want tomorrow, next month and next year.

So what is your short, mid and long-term PB goal? My wife and I share the same goal or PB: experience summer in December and January. How? Travel to the Southern Hemisphere! Our oldest daughter and son-in-law live in New Zealand. While we get to communicate easily due to technology, we have not seen their smiling faces in person and embraced since 2019. This may not happen anytime soon, but we remain focused and determined to make it happen. Anything less would be to admit defeat.

We can learn a lot from the elite athlete. Even when they may know they are out of the medals, they keep fighting, like an injured runner rejecting assistance to cross the finish line. We need to stay the course and keep focused on achieving our goal, whenever the opportunity to achieve it may present itself.
