EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE UPCOMING 2020 CENSUS



iCount-2020

Have you marked your calendar? The 2020 Census is here and your participation is vital! Every 10 years, the U.S. Census Bureau counts how many people are living in the United States and uses that data to allocate \$675 billion in federal funds to support programs in education, healthcare, transportation, parks and recreation services and other important local resources. Counting everyone in your household in the 2020 Census is your opportunity to help your community receive funding for public programs and services.

Filling Out the Census Form: Participating in the census is now easier than ever with three secure and confidential ways to respond. Each household will receive a code in the mail in March 2020, directing the head of the household to complete the questionnaire online, by phone, or by mail. 2020 will be the first time in history that people can complete the form online, making it convenient for families on-the-go. To complete the survey digitally, go to the website listed on the census information you receive in the mail, answer the questions and click submit.

Additionally, you can call the toll-free number on the notification mailed to your household to respond by phone, or you can fill out your census form by hand and mail it back in the pre-paid return envelope. Each method takes under 10 minutes to complete and is completely safe and secure.

Census Security: The Census questionnaire asks you to share demographic information but your answers are strictly kept private and anonymous, even to other government agencies. Title 13 of the U.S. Code prohibits the Census Bureau from releasing any identifiable information about you or anyone else in your household. This law extends to protect your information from being shared with any person, organization, court, business or government agency, including law enforcement.

Anyone employed by the Census Bureau is sworn under oath to protect any identifiable information. Violating this law is a federal crime which could result in a \$250,000 fine and/or up-to 5 years in jail. These strict penalties are put in place to ensure that census data is only used to generate the statistics that guide the distribution of \$675 billion in federal funding and allocation of congressional representation.

The Census Bureau also houses a group of cyber security experts who monitor and secure the bureau's technology 24/7. They work alongside federal intelligence agencies to provide continuous protection from census scammers and incoming cyber threats.

Why You Count: You count for your community! In Arizona, census data helps with the distribution of federal funding across 55 programs, including the National Lunch Program, federal student loan programs, and many other programs that enhance quality of life. For each person counted, the state receives \$2,959 in federal funding totaling more than \$20 billion per year, which goes toward vital services including schools, emergency services, and hospitals.

The United States has counted its population each decade since 1790. Every 10 years you have a chance to participate and make sure you are counted, both for you and your community. Now is the time, the 2020 census is here!

As members of iCount2020, the regional census outreach campaign to educate the public and ensure an accurate count of Arizona in the 2020 Census, we have made education about the census a priority. People can email or call our census coordinator, Leila Gamiz at leila.gamiz@phoenix.gov or 602-262-4078 to learn more about how every man, woman and child has a direct impact on local programs. The upcoming 2020 Census is a monumental event that only occurs every ten years. It is important that we get it right to ensure Phoenix receives its fair share of funding.

APS Working with Community Groups to Help Local Communities

Local Electricity provider Arizona Public Service (APS) does more than provide electricity to households in Arizona. The company partners with many community organizations to strengthen local communities.

Diamond Back Fields Building

Along with the Arizona Diamondbacks, APS provides new and updated field equipment, including lights, scoreboards, fencing, grass and irrigation systems.

Since 2000, the Arizona Diamondbacks Foundation has built or refurbished 42 baseball and softball fields representing a community investment of more than \$10 million. With support from APS, and charitable contributions from D-backs players, the program has allowed children from across the state to play baseball and softball at quality facilities. The fields generally feature new lights, a branded electronic scoreboard, new fencing and backstops, new irrigation and new grass and dirt with additional support provided by local contractors and businesses.

The evaluation and determination of the location of each field is determined by a grant process. A new "Diamonds Back Field" is awarded annually.

Applications are due in July of each year and a link to the application form is available on the Arizona Diamondbacks' website at:

If you're looking for the latest news from the city of Phoenix, you can now find it all in one place. The Communications Office has created a dynamic online news and information platform that easily connects you with a real-time feed of content about the city. In the PHXNewsroom you can catch unique local programming produced by PHXTV and find news and updates. The distinctive look, feel and functionality of the PHXNewsroom was developed by the Communications Office and Information Technology Services Department staff in collaboration with all city departments. It's easy to read, easy to watch, and easy to share and can be found at https://www.phoenix.gov/newsroom.

As you know, every year the city of Phoenix develops its annual budget. More than \$1.4 billion General Fund operating budget includes everything from police and fire services, to parks, libraries, and senior services. To help residents better understand how our budget is created, the Budget & Research Department has added a new tool to gather feedback and help you see what makes Phoenix run. Called FundPHX, this software lets you see for yourself what each service costs, and how much it would cost (or save) when you change service levels. The city of Phoenix Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program opened on Tuesday, Jan. 28. There are three ways we can help many residents file taxes and save hundreds of dollars in paid preparer fees. Residents can do it online from home, visit one of our facilities where a volunteer can guide them through the online process or make an appointment for a certified preparer to do their taxes. ARIZONA'S BIGGEST PARKING GARAGE IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION!

Arizona's biggest parking garage is going up in the middle of Phoenix in one of its oldest shopping centers – Park Central Mall.

The 10 story parking garage with 551,000 square feet will have more than 2,000 spaces for the new \$100 million Creighton University medical school, apartments, restaurants, office tenants and another hotel.

The City supported developers, Plaza Cos. and Holualoa Cos., move to revitalize the aging mall, but asked (Continued on page 7)
