Postcard from the Past - Sky Harbor Terminal 2



Those who have traveled through Sky Harbor Airport's Terminal 2 may remember a large mural called, Phoenix" in the main lobby. It is believed to be the first piece of city-commissioned art chosen through a public process. Artists from across the US were invited to submit mural concepts for the new terminal, which were then put on display at the Phoenix Public Library. Residents voted for their favorite design and picked the concept by Arizona artist Paul Coze. The mural debuted when Terminal 2 opened in 1962.

The mural is 75 feet long and consists of three panels. It is more of a mosaic than a painting, in that 52 different materials were incorporated into the work. According to the description on the back of the postcard, the center panel "Water and Fire" shows the Phoenix Bird aflame as it sits on a date tree, burning himself to be reborn from the ashes. Smoke turns into rain clouds and water is collected by Roosevelt Dam.

When Terminal 2 was closed and demolished in 2020, the mural was relocated to the Sky Harbor Rental Car Center, where it can be seen today.

THE 2023 RETIREE BENEFITS OPEN ENROLLMENT PERIOD IS OCTOBER 17 - NOVEMBER 14

The open enrollment period for making changes to your 2023 retiree benefits is Monday, October 17 through Monday, November 14, 2022, no later than 11:59 PM. You do not have to re-enroll in benefits unless you are making changes to your current benefit elections, adding or dropping dependents, or opting out of coverage.

For Plan Year 2023 the City will continue to offer two dental plan options, Vision, Legal, and Pet Insurance, and a choice between four Non-Medicare Retiree medical plans that include an HMO, PPO, HSA, and Catastrophic Plan.

The link to the Retiree Open Enrollment website is: www.Phoenix.gov/benefitsretiree. There you can review and access the 2023 Retiree Benefit Guide, Open Enrollment information, and other important information relevant to your retiree benefits.

Due to the persistent risk of Covid-19 for retirees, the City is only offering Live Virtual Information Sessions. The Benefits Office in partnership with United Healthcare will be available during each virtual event to address any benefit plan option-related questions you may have. Purchase Series I Bonds to Hedge Against Inflation


Need a safe hedge against inflation? Consider purchasing Series I Savings Bonds, also known as I Bonds.

I Bonds are a US government security that earns interest at a fixed rate, adjusted twice a year based on inflation. The current interest rate for I Bonds purchased through the end of October is 9.62 percent. That rate will be applied to the 6 months after the purchase is made. For example, if you buy an I Bond on October 15, 2022, the 9.62% rate would be applied through April 15, 2023. A new rate is set every six months based on the bond's fixed rate (0.00 percent) and on inflation. Interest is compounded semi-annually.

To purchase I Bonds, you must first establish an account through TreasuryDirect. The maximum purchase for electronic I Bonds is \$10,000 per calendar year. Paper bonds are also available, but they must be bought with your tax refund and the maximum annual purchase \$5,000. The interest-earning period is 30 years or until you cash them. Minimum term of ownership is one year. If they are redeemed before 5 years, interest from the previous 3 months will be forfeited. There is no penalty after that. - In the movie Halloween, Michael Myers' mask was a Captain Kirk Star Trek mask painted white.
- Fear of Halloween is called Samhainophobia.
- The term "jack-o'-lantern" dates back to a 18th-century lrish folktale of Stingy Jack, a blacksmith who had a fondness for mischief and booze. As the story goes, Stingy Jack tricked the devil twice. When Jack died, he found himself barred from heaven -- and from hell. But the devil took some pity on Jack, giving him an ember of coal to light his turnip lantern as he wandered between both places for eternity.
- The word witch comes from the Old English word "Wicce" -- a wise woman or a female healer.
- Halloween is the second highest-grossing commercial holiday after Christmas. In 2021, Americans spent \$10.1 billion on Halloween, nearly double what was spent in 2005.
- An estimated 172 million
