PHOENIX PUBLIC LIBRARY CELEBRATES 125 YEARS! LEE FRANKLIN - PHOENIX PUBLIC LIBRARY

Phoenix Public Library is looking forward to another full year, and our big news is 2023 marks our system's 125th anniversary of serving our community!

On June 21, 1898 the "Friday Club" opened our first Phoenix Public Library location in two upstairs rooms of the Fleming Building at Washington and First Avenue. This was the result of fourteen women recognizing the need for Phoenix, incorporated as a city in 1881, to have a free library. In 1901, the Arizona Legislature passed a bill allowing a tax to support free libraries, qualifying Phoenix to have a donated library building from Mr. Andrew Carnegie. The Carnegie Free Library at 11th Avenue and Washington was opened in February of 1908 and served as our primary location until 1952. It was replaced by the original central library constructed on property donated by the Heard family at Central and McDowell.

In 1995, our current flagship, Burton Barr Central Library was opened, and the original central library became what is now the (Continued on page 2)

More Results from the Member Survey Brian Suggs

We presented the results of the first eight (of ten total) survey questions in the last *Chronicle*. But there is much more! The last two questions asked you to send us your questions, concerns and suggestions. Between those two questions, we received several hundred responses from you. We are continuing to compile and categorize those responses, but here are some of the first issues we are addressing:

 <u>Lifetime membership</u> – many of you commented about this suggestion, and responses were split. One thing that was clear was that membership felt that a lifetime membership payment could be a good option, but only if added to our current options to pay for a one- or five-year membership.



You don't need any special skills, just a desire to help your fellow retirees.



POSTCARDS FROM THE PAST



This postcard was probably issued shortly after the Arizona Biltmore Hotel opened on February 23, 1929. Note the wide expanse of undisturbed desert in the background. The resort was way out of town at the time!

Contrary to popular belief, the Arizona Biltmore was not designed by Frank Lloyd Wright, but Albert Chase McArthur, brother of the hotel owners Warren and Charles McArthur. In fact, Frank Lloyd Wright was never licensed as an architect in Arizona despite having a hand in designing Taliesin

West, Grady Gammage Memorial Auditorium, and other

famous buildings in the Phoenix area. The misnomer that Wright designed the Arizona Biltmore relates back to a four-month period when he consulted on implementing the "textile block" system, which became a signature design element of the hotel's appearance. The style of block he recommended was not used, but that did not deter him from taking credit for the building's design, thus adding to the lore of this architectural gem.

How to Access Information About COPERS

Did you know you can access information about our pension plan (COPERS) through the City's website? Use this link https://www.phoenix.gov/copers/pension-plan-reports to access quarterly investment, real estate, and performance statistic reports as well as annual financial and actuarial reports. These documents provide a wealth of information which can be overwhelming so we've provided a brief overview of the information included in each of the reports to help you navigate the reports.

<u>Quarterly Investment Reports</u> – Prepared by our investment advisor, this report provides detailed information on the pension fund, including where the money is invested and quarterly, year-to-date, 1-year, 3-year, 5-year, and 10-year rate of return for all investments.

<u>Quarterly Real Estate Investment Reports</u> – Prepared by our real estate managers, this report provides a deeper dive into those investments. The overview page discusses market conditions and provides charts of the 5-year quarterly returns and returns by sector. There is also a pie chart in the document showing portfolio diversification by geography and property type.

<u>Performance Statistic Reports</u> – These reports are prepared by the Retirement Department to show the work being performed in the Department. It includes things such as number of customer contacts, number of retirees, etc.

<u>Annual Actuarial Reports</u> – Prepared by our actuarial firm, these reports measure COPERS funding progress and determine the employer contribution rate.

<u>Annual Comprehensive Financial Reports (ACFR)</u> – The official audited financial statements of COPERS.

<u>Popular Annual Financial Reports (PAFR)</u> – A summary of the ACFR and designed to convey important information in a condensed and easily understood manner. For an interesting and quick overview of the status of COPERS, this is the report to use.
